

season. Built in 1912, Le Grand Bellevue is one of the oldest and most stately hotels in the fabled Swiss ski-resort town of Gstaad. A yearlong renovation by new owners Daniel and Davia Koester has given the grande dame a fresh, friendly look. The hotel's 57 rooms (including A-frame suites that overlook the slopes) and cozy public spaces mix classic furnishings, Davia's custom alpine-inspired creations, and appealingly colorful wallcoverings and upholstery (bellevue-gstaad.com).

VISITORS SNAP PHOTOS OF TIFFANY'S WINDOWS ON NEW YORK'S FIFTH AVENUE EVERY DAY, BUT HOW MANY LOOK UP AT THE DIGNIFIED 1940 BUILDING, LEFT, THAT RISES ABOVE? THE OFFICE TOWERS, BANKS, LUXURY APARTMENT HOUSES, AND COUNTRY ESTATES BUILT BY ARCHITECT BROTHERS JOHN WALTER AND ELIOT CROSS HIDE IN PLAIN SIGHT, FRE-QUENTLY UPSTAGED BY SHOWIER MODERNIST NEIGHBORS. NEW YORK TRANSFORMED (THE MONACELLI PRESS), BY ARCHITECT PETER PENNOYER AND SCHOLAR ANNE WALKER, DRAWS THE SPOTLIGHT BACK TO THE WORK OF THESE FORGOTTEN MASTERS, FROM MAYFIELDS, ABOVE LEFT, AN IDYLLIC 1921 NEW JERSEY MANSION THAT BECAME THE HOME OF FUTURE DESIGNER SISTER PARISH (WHO TERMED THE HOUSE "PERFECTION"), TO THE "GREAT SYMMETRICAL PALAZZO" OF ONE SUTTON PLACE SOUTH IN MANHATTAN (1926), ABOVE RIGHT. PROOF THAT THESE TRADITIONALISTS HAD A WILD SIDE CAN BE FOUND IN THE FANTASTICAL GOTHIC EFFIGIES ATOP THEIR 1931 GENERAL ELECTRIC SKYSCRAPER.
