purpose:	People credited with this unit standard are able to: select clothing and fit personal equipment; demonstrate kayaking skills; demonstrate rescue procedures; and demonstrate an understanding for the care for self, others and the environment.
entry information:	Open.
accreditation option:	Evaluation of documentation by NZQA and industry.
moderation option:	A centrally established and directed national moderation system has been set up by the Sport, Fitness and Recreation Industry Training Organisation – Outdoor Recreation Advisory Group.
special notes:	 Definitions Barrel roll is a kayak rescue where the rescuer rights a capsized kayak containing a client. Kayak is a water craft that has a small cockpit with a fitted spraydeck and is propelled by a double ended paddle. Sheltered water or slow-moving water is water protected from the effects of significant wind and wave action. This includes estuaries, river deltas, sheltered beaches, lakes and coastal inlets with minimal tidal speed. This type of water excludes Grade I whitewater rivers, open seas and large lakes. T rescue is a rescue whereby a capsized kayaker rights their kayak using support from another kayak. X rescue is a deep water rescue whereby the kayaker has fully capsized and empties and re-enters the kayak while remaining in the water.

Elements and Performance Criteria

element 1

Select clothing and fit personal equipment.

performance criteria

1.1 Clothing is selected for kayaking.

Range: protection, insulation, comfort.

1.2 Personal gear is selected and fitted correctly.

Range: kayak, paddle, helmet, buoyancy aid, spraydeck.

element 2

Demonstrate kayaking skills.

performance criteria

2.1 Getting in to and out of a kayak are demonstrated safely at the water's edge.

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- 2.2 Effective forward and reverse paddling strokes are demonstrated.
- 2.3 Controlled turns are performed.

Range: forward, reverse sweep strokes, stern rudder.

- 2.4 Obstacles are avoided by using a combination of strokes.
 - Range: may include is but not limited to emergency stop, forward sweep, reverse sweep, stern rudder.
- 2.5 A capsize and wet exit is demonstrated from a kayak.

element 3

Demonstrate rescue procedures.

performance criteria

- 3.1 Rescue procedures as a rescuee are demonstrated.
 - Range: X rescue, T rescue, barrel roll, throw bag, swim to side with kayak and paddle.

element 4

Demonstrate an understanding for the care for self, others, and the environment.

performance criteria

- 4.1 Knowledge of management strategies for potential health problems associated with flat water are demonstrated.
 - Range: hypothermia, cold water immersion, cramps, sunburn, blisters, dislocations, head injuries.
- 4.2 The New Zealand Environmental Care Code and New Zealand Water Care Code are applied.
- 4.3 Communications systems are identified and understood on and off the water.

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Range: hand, paddle and whistle signals; voice.
