COMMODORE'S REPORT TO 2016 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING



The following is a summary of my Commodore's Report presented to the Annual General Meeting on Tuesday 19th July 2016. I am pleased to present my Commodore's Report for the 2015/2016 year.

Many of our achievements and results are now summarised in the Club's Financial Accounts as part of the "Statement of Service Performance".

Accordingly, I will on briefly touch on a few additional points and acknowledgements.

Financial Results

The Club's financial performance, this year, is down on prior years, and this is disappointing. The Club continues to achieve an operating and cash surplus but after allowing for non-cash expenses (depreciation of close to \$40,000), an accounting loss resulted.

This poorer financial result is mostly related to a decline in clubhouse hire and bar income (both somewhat interdependent).

There are, and will be, a number of new initiatives with a focus on improving this part of the Club's operations. These include further enhancements to the interior and exterior of the Club, the road frontage, new signage, and the new website.

Sailing

My thanks to the sailing master and team for a great sailing calendar over this past season, culminating in our prize giving last month.

Again, we have had a year with a variety of events and destinations which have been well attended. Our participation levels are particularly pleasing in relation to our big events of the year, including the Duder's Cup, our Easter Cruise, and the shorthanded events. My thanks also to the team who assist the sailing committee, including our start and finish

Haulage has had another busy and successful year.

boats, and of course the starting team.

The main challenge has been the new Health & Safety rules and ensuring our haulage activities remain on top of this.

Derek and his haulage team have done an outstanding job in implementing necessary changes to ensure we can continue to operate this very important part of the Club.

Social Committee

The social committee continue to be strong supporters of the Club through various social activities, as well as supporting other Club events throughout the year.

A particular highlight was the 110-year anniversary celebrations held last year, which were a huge success.

Education Evenings

We embarked on a revitalised series of education evenings last year, led by our Rear Commodore Geoff Evans. These six evenings were well attended and covered a number of different and interesting topics. Some have been open to the public, as part of our wider community involvement. My thanks to Geoff, and I look forward to these continuing.

Membership

The Club's membership is relatively stable, at 335 as at May 2016. Some initiatives are in pipeline to improve member engagement and attract new members. These will be rolled out in the coming year.

Health & Safety

The Club has had a significant focus on Health & Safety matters this past year, in particular with haulage as noted earlier. This will be an ongoing area of improvement and monitoring by the Club.

Rules rewrite

I would like to record my thanks to the rules rewrite Committee, Natasha, Sue, Wayne, and Bill. It has been almost two years of effort and we are now close to holding a Special General Meeting.

My thanks also to those members who attended one or both of the forums or submitted feedback.

Finally, a few thank yous.

To my fellow flag officers, Natasha and Geoff, thanks for your significant support of me over these last two years.

Also, to our President and immediate Past President, my thanks for your support and encouragement.

CHANGES TO THE MARITIME MOBILE REPEATER ALLOCATIONS

aritime radio channels will be changing on 1 October 2016.

New Zealand, along with a number of other countries, is required to change some maritime VHF repeater channels to make space for newly allocated international services for ship tracking and data services.

New Zealand will be moving a few private VHF repeater services, most Coastguard VHF repeater services, and all NowCasting weather services to accommodate these changes.

The frequency changes will take place in New Zealand on October 1 2016, before the peak summer recreational boating season when VHF radio services become busy. This ensures New Zealand is ready for the changes that come into force internationally on 1 January 2017.

STORIES FROM THE PAST

Over the coming months, I will include some old naval sayings, which will intrigue all and offer an explanation as to their origin. (Reproduced with kind permission of the RNZN Museum)



Toe the line:

Conform to laws, rules or doctrines

When a ship's crew was called on deck, sailors would stand in neat rows with men in each row lining their toes along a seam running between two deck planks.

Touch and go:

Uncertain; risky

Two dangerous circumstances were perhaps the origin of the expression 'touch and go'. A ship that touched the bottom would get off as quickly as it could. Two ships that transferred goods or people from one to the other got so close that they touched.

Try a different tack:

Try an alternative course of action

Ordinarily, a ship didn't sail in a straight line with the wind directly behind it. In order to progress a ship was required to change direction, or tack, according to the direction of the wind.

Turn a blind eye:

Ignore

At the Battle of Copenhagen in 1801, Nelson was signaled an order from the Admiral of the Fleet. Nelson put his telescope to his blind eye so as not to see the order; thinking that to carry out the order would have endangered his ships on nearby shallows.



TO THE ICE AND BEYOND.

Sailing Solo Across 32 Oceans and Seaways.. By Graeme Kendall. Hardback. 0.48kg, 205 pages, 160mm x 238mm, Colour photographs, Published 2016.

Kiwi yachtsman Graeme Kendall was the first person to sail the Northwest Passage solo non-stop. Sailing east to west, he knocked off the "Everest of sailing" in just 12 days - the fastest recorded - as part of his extraordinary solo circumnavigation of the globe. This is a story of determination, meticulous planning and rugged courage. All alone for 193 days in his purpose-built yacht Astral Express, Kendall crossed 28,000 miles of ocean, facing some of the Earth's most terrifying seas.

An enthralling adventure, To The Ice And Beyond is an inspiration to all of us to live our dreams, and never to give up.



Graeme Kendall MNZM (Member of the New Zealand order of merit) is a highly experienced sailor who has sailed in many different parts of the world, including ocean racing. Born in Christchurch, he has sailed since he was a teenager and as an adult has owned several well-known classic heritage yachts including Galatea and Pastime. In 1986 he sailed in the Whitbread Round the World Race with Digby Taylor aboard NZI Enterprise. The following year Graeme and his friend Stan Pearson sailed his yacht Astral Rose in the inaugural two-handed Melbourne-to-Osaka race. He has been self-employed since the age of 25, with a business career that culminated in farming and residential property.

Graeme currently lives in Auckland where he is a charter yacht skipper. His boyhood dream has always been to sail solo through the Northwest Passage.
