REPORT

As 2015 comes to a close one is afforded the opportunity to reflect on the numerous and varied achievements and experiences of our students over the year. It therefore gives me great pleasure to report on the outstanding achievements of so many fine young people who make up the student body of our great School.

On the academic front, our Dux last year, Dinuka Perera, was placed within the top 65 students with the highest academic achievement out of all students across the country, gaining an Outstanding Scholar Award. Our 2014 NCEA Level 1, 2 and 3 results placed us well above comparable schools of our decile classification and significantly above the NZ national average. With 17 individual subject scholarships being awarded, two at "outstanding level" and Level 3

Mäori achievement at 81% for 2014, WHS academic performance continues to be exceptional. In the Cambridge International Mathematics examinations at the end of 2014, twelve of our students gained either A or A* at IGCSE, AS and /or A level. Further outstanding successes were gained by Year 13 students studying Mathematics this year at Auckland University and others competing in the French DELF Scholaire examinations.

On the sports fields, as in the past, we again dominated many of the codes in our region. Of particular mention are the Maadi Cup Gold medal winners, Kayla Spencer and Jessica Brougham, who won the girls'UI8 Double Sculls event. The Rowing team came home with 4 medals and some outstanding results which placed us 22nd overall in NZ. In Mixed Touch, our team has been placed second in NZ for the past two years with 4 players selected for the mixed-grade national tournament team. Jessica Watkin was selected for the NZ UI8 Indoor Cricket team and Emma Rainey was selected for the NZ U18 Hockey team while Elena Forlong gained national selection for Butterfly in Swimming. So many of our other teams performed very well due primarily to the commitment and hard work of both the players and their coaches.

In the performing arts, cultural and service realms our students have also done exceptionally well. The School Production "Annie" was held in the Wanganui Opera House with over 100 performers and crew. It was a large undertaking that was a resounding success, thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended and participated. Our Choir attended the Sydney

> places in a range of competitions. Several students gained their Duke of Edinburgh Hillary Gold Awards which is a remarkable achievement given the level of difficulty of the challenges and the sheer determination demanded of the participants.

term 3. The reviewers were most impressed with our students and their high level of achievement across a wide range of learning and co-curricular activities.

With respect to staffing we were very proud of Mrs Jacqui Luxton who was appointed principal at St Mary's School at the end of term one. We were sorry to lose her but know that she is destined to be a great principal. The sad passing, in January, of our much loved and highly respected fabric technology teacher. Mrs Elizabeth McKnight, devastating blow to so many of our students and staff. She was an outstanding teacher and she will long be remembered as one who cared greatly about her students achieving their personal best in everything they did.

Due to personal health issues I missed most of term 2 and some of term 3. During this time our

Associate Principal, Mrs Spooner, most effectively led the School as Acting Principal. She had to deal with a number of very challenging situations and she did this extremely professionally so that our core business of teaching and learning could progress unhindered.

The tragic car accident that took the life of Zane Town who was well-liked by his Year 10 peers had a very marked effect on our student body and our wider School community. He is sadly missed by all his friends and once again we express our sincerest condolences to his family.

The flood caused severe distress and huge difficulties for a large number of our students, their families, some of our teachers and our wider School community who lost personal possessions and homes. In many ways WHS was most fortunate

in that the only flooding the School endured was the complete inundation of our playing fields. Our thoughts were with Wanganui Girls College when they had severe flooding of large parts of their school grounds. It was particularly pleasing





Unlike today when a helicopter can be hired to drop things off, everything went in on peoples backs – Brylin + Viviene


Now days there is an annual firewood trip where staff and students can challenge themselves taking in as many loads of firewood as they can. – 1998

On the 24th of April, Wanganui High School held their own ANZAC service for the 100th year anniversary of the Gallipoli landings in 1915 during world war one. In preparation for the event several white crosses were placed in front of the staff room bearing the names of New Zealand soldiers who were killed on the beaches and in the hills, fighting for their country. At first break the entire school gathered on the field to the music of an open mic, a barbecue and plenty of ANZAC biscuits. At precisely 11:40 the school fell silent for a minute to commemorate the soldiers who fought on the battlefields of Gallipoli. the silence was broken by the sound of a bugle playing the last post and reveille. The event was concluded with the reading of the ode of remembrance. This was a momentous occasion and so many of the students that attended would have had relatives who fought in

The following day more than 100 WHS students braved the cold, early morning to attend the city wide dawn parade on the forecourt of the War Memorial Hall . Myself and three other WHS students were privileged to be chosen to stand cenotaph guard for the duration of the service. This was by far the biggest dawn service Wanganui had ever had with an estimated 10,000 people attending. The sun rose to the sound of gunshots echoing over the city which concluded the service. One hundred years later, their sacrifice is not forgotten.



August 2nd was when the Asia Science Camp began. We stayed





A little rest at the top of the main uphill, the weather and the stunning view was all it took for us to be completely convinced we had made the right decision even if we were having second thoughts mid steps. These things also made the hours tramping speed by, and before we knew it we were in sight of where we were going to be spending that nights.

When we did arrive we went through the regular routines of settling in, and were about to light a fire to warm the Hutt up when we hit a small snag; no firewood. Undaunted, and not fancying the prospect of a cold night, Mr Mackerel led the boys off in a search for firewood, but the perpetual damp of Taranaki, even if the day is fine, means everything is perpetually damp. 
The next morning however our fortunes turned slightly; we woke to an altogether gloomier morning.




We as a group had to plan the trip from beginning to end and also had to lead a section of the trip ourselves. By doing this it


We are also planning a trip where we can survey the area and get hands on experience with what it's like to be in the field where all the action is. So far we have multiple ideas and are very excited to







so as I drown myself with scotch and wheel myself off to bed I take my hat off one more time for the memories I made and shared with you in being part of a wonderful show.





The senior athletics was run in much the same




