During Mr Olver's illness and absence I would also like to acknowledge Mrs Spooner for her leadership of the school during that time, and in addition, all other staff who were required to take on an extra work load.

Schools are, in the first instance, places of learning. I congratulate all those who made the most of their classroom experiences as students, and all staff who made the professional commitment to see our young people grow and develop.

There have been a number of highlights during the year, most recently the winning of the National Stage Challenge. What is particularly significant about this is that the theme '29 Below' (the Pike River Mine Disaster) was and still is a contentious one, and the production was able to capture key elements of what is now an important event in New Zealand's history. What is also significant is that this is not the first time that Whanganui High School has been successful in this very competitive setting. This success and others in the academic field and many sports arenas reflect the energy of motivated, capable students and staff.

When Year 13 students arrive at the beginning of their final year in the school, for the first time they are able to look at those who follow without having anyone

above them to cloud that view. On the other hand, they are able to look comfortably into the distance and contemplate their own futures. To all those who have had formal and informal leadership roles in the school, thank you for understanding the need to model what a good young man or good young woman would and should be. Schools are dependent upon senior students who understand the role they play in contributing to sound decision-making across the school and ensuring that young people are safe and secure in the school environment.

To the support staff who are the glue that joins the bricks of Whanganui High School together, we are blessed to have such a highly motivated and skilled group of administration and property staff who allow the day to day activities of the school to run smoothly. Thank you for your loyalty during 2016 and the extra things you have done beyond what is normally required.

To those staff who have now completed their time at Whanganui High School, on behalf of all those you have taught in 2016 and years past, thank you. Being an educator is a special gift and the lessons provided exist forever, so we are thankful to you for your professional commitment to the young people of the city.

On behalf of the School Community, I would like to thank Mr Southee, as well as past and recently elected Board members for the significant commitment they have made to this community. Governance, in

an ever-changing and accountable world, is never easy and I congratulate them on the work they have done to date.

At the time of writing, the Board of Trustees was in the process of appointing a new Principal. At the time of publication this process will have been completed. I would like to think that the new Principal will be accorded the sort of welcome I experienced when I arrived in August. Principal-ship is never carried out alone and is an increasingly demanding role. I am sure that the 2017 Principal of Whanganui High School will understand the history of the school and enhance its future as a leading co-educational school in the country.

I would like to thank those responsible for the annual production of The Record. The kaleidoscope of school images and stories that are captured each year are so important to the story of the school. Thank you, Mr and Mrs Coombs, for your efforts to ensure that the school's history is recorded for generations to come.

To conclude, I want to share some words of wisdom from the Dalai Lama XIV. When asked, "What thing about humanity surprises you the most?" the Dalai Lama answered: "Man Because he sacrifices his health in order to make money. Then he sacrifices money to recuperate his health. And then he is so anxious about the future that he does not enjoy the present, the result being that he does not live in the present or the future; he lives as if he is never going to die, and then dies having never really lived."

School leavers need to heed this message and manage their lives to ensure that the very best is gained from each decision and each life choice. All the very best.


To the Class of 2016: these 5 years with you have been unforgettable.

The room started to get a little bit heated. Can you imagine 60 or more teenagers in a room not allowed to talk?



On April 1st, numerous delegations, from Denmark and Mexico to Canada and France, made up of three students, attended the annual Senior Model United Nations event at Wanganui Girls College. The purpose of this event was to educate students in civics in an assembly environment. Through serious discussions, we were engaged in the most pressing and current affairs in the international community. This connects young people from different secondary schools in the Whanganui region who care for the welfare of the international community, and allows them to develop social and confidence skills, adopt their own perspectives, and strengthen their abilities to become global citizens.

Students had to dress in clothing that is traditional or worn in that particular country, for instance the Mexicans dressed in sombreros and ponchos with guitars, as well as decorating their table with artefacts from that country or their flag. At the end of last year, the students doing the Gold Duke of Edinburgh Hillary award completed their Gold Qualifying expedition on a four-day canoeing trip down the Whanganui River.

Day One

Today we all woke up early after a great night's sleep at the Ohakune Canoe Safari Lodge. After a quick breakfast, we all assembled downstairs in the carpark where we were introduced to our guide, Alex. Upon reaching Cherry Grove in Taumaranui, we unpacked the van and paired up in the Canadian canoes. Before we set off, we were instructed on how to steer, and we practised on the shore before hitting the water. As the weather was quite cold and raining, I was unwilling and quite nervous about tipping out on our first day.



Day Two

We left Poukaria campsite at 8:30, which was earlier than we had planned. Today was our longest day, since we planned to cover a distance of 48km. Brylee and I still had a little trouble steering through eddies, but thankfully managed not to tip out. Today the river was much calmer than it had been yesterday, with fewer rapids and less eddies. I really enjoyed travelling along the calmer stretches of water, which I found to be a very beautiful and serene experience. We were therefore able to make good time and covered around 30 kilometres before lunch time. After dinner Alex brought his guitar and played music for us and the German and French tourists at the campsite while we ate chocolate and wrote our diaries.

Day Three

Today we canoed 36km further down the river. The sides of the river were quite steep here, and we could see the holes in the rock walls that were created as a place for old steamers to anchor as they travelled down the Whanganui River, when steamers were the main form of transport across the North Island. I was also surprised to see large landslips that still remained from the floods that hit Whanganui last year. A little further from the Mangawaiiti campsite was the landing to the Bridge to Nowhere. From the landing there was a further 40 minute walk to the Bridge to Nowhere, which was built over the Mangapurua stream.

Day Four

Unfortunately our guide, Alex, had contracted food poisoning and had been very unwell throughout the night. Because of this, we were quite late to start off, at around 9:30. Alex was still very unwell and we had to stop regularly for him to rest on the side of the river. In the calmer stretches of water we used

bungee ropes to tie all four canoes together and built a raft with Alannah and Alex's boat in the middle so they didn't have to paddle and he could sleep.

We also faced three major rapids today - Ngaporo, Autapu and Paparoa - and we managed to effectively navigate through them without tipping, which I was very proud of.

At 2:00 we finally reached the landing, very tired but happy to have completed our journey. At Base we emptied our barrels, washed them out and thanked our guide, who was thankfully was feeling better. Miss Belton then drove us back to Ohakune at around 4:00, stopping for ice cream in Raetihi before finally travelling home to Whanganui.

Although I was glad to be home, our river trip remains forever in my memory. From this trip, not only did I learn how to work together to paddle a Canadian canoe, or how to keep my lunch dry when it is pouring with rain, but also about how a river can provide strength, spirit and sustenance to all people. I feel incredibly privileged to have had the opportunity to experience the wonder and beauty of New Zealand nature that is really right on my doorstep.


Day One:

Day Two:

On the second day we woke up at about 6am and left the hut near 8am. It was cold to begin with but soon got warm while we were walking. Our first point was Cone Hut, which was a really old hut. We stopped there for snacks and it was really cool. We continued walking the track alongside a river, until we got up to the Cone saddle which was between two summits. I lead the group from there up to 572m where I fell into a river! I got a bit wet but we kept walking and met the boys' group, who started from the other direction, at the halfway point. After having a snack with them we kept walking. We eventually came down the hill, but it was very muddy and slippery so we ended up coming down very fast. When we got to the Waiohine River, we filled up our water bottles. We reached the Totara Flats Hut around 4pm after a long walk in the open. My toes really hurt, and to top it off, I burnt my pasta!







SOUTHISLAND

The day started extremely early as we met at school at 4.30am ready to travel to Palmerston North to catch our flight to Christchurch. Once we met John, our bus driver, and stocked up on supplies, we headed west. It was a packed first day and we ticked off Springfield (quick photo by the donut), Lake Lyndon (some awesome post glacial features to be sketched here), Castle Hill (great evidence of the weathering of limestone), Flock Hill station and the river terraces evident at Cave Stream (not to mention the film setting for the Chronicles of Narnia). Our access to the West Coast was via Arthurs Pass and the impressive feat of engineering that is the Otira Viaduct. Past Lake Brunner until we reached Greymouth for the end of a very busy day. Through the majestic gates of Haast and a beautiful drive to see the trees grow at Thunder Creek falls and some stone skimming at the Blue Pools. Our accommodation in the A frames of Makarora was a step back in time.


Puzzling World next before a short stop in scenic Wanaka. We had the opportunity to hear a tourism talk






Maatangi Whenua is a regional geography competition held for Year 11 Geography students all around New Zealand.



Whanganui High School international students were organized by their prefects to perform a concert at the school hall on the 18th of June, giving their all to a packed house. It was a fabulous evening for the students and the audience.

The food was served in the side room of the hall from 6:00pm before the show. Every country group involved provided the early attendants with various cuisines, for example, delicious sweets from Brazil, mouth-watering dumplings and peanut crisps from China, fluffy egg tarts and waffles from Hong Kong, tasty flans from Vietnam, savoury rice balls from Japan, crusty pretzels from Germany, and flavourful fried rice from Thailand.

WHAT IS DELF? The DELF (Diplôme d'Études en Langue Française) exam consists of four levels, A1, A2, B1 and B2. Passing the B2 exam provides the student with a certificate that allows them to study at any French University (not just in France but in any of the 36 countries where French is an official language) without having to sit a proficiency test first. It is clear then that this exam is a very important, prestigious and well-recognised qualification the world over. DELF consists of 4 assessment parts, Listening Comprehension, Reading Comprehension, Written Production and Oral Production, and unlike NCEA all answers must be written in French.

In early September 2016, six local linguists from WHS travelled to the thriving metropolis of Palmerston North to sit their respective DELF exams, run through the local branch of Alliance Française. Across the country, hundreds of students had spent their afternoons studying not only for their school mock exams, but also for this internationally recognised certificate of language proficiency, in one of the most beautiful languages used on our planet.

2016 marked the second year that the local Alliance Française had provided Palmerston and the region the opportunity to sit this exam, and WHS participation had more than doubled from 2015. This year WHS sent a delegation consisting of Josephine Verhaaren (A2), George Iliffe (A2), Jadzia Morris (B1), Brenna Hadley (B2), Connor Cresswell (B2) and Jeanne-Marie Bonnet (B2). Josephine, George, Brenna and Connor joined the veterans Jadzia and Jeanne-Marie this year, and performed exceedingly well. Year 11 students Josephine and George completed A2 (from the CIEP curriculum level), which is the equivalent of NCEA L2/ L3. These students did exceedingly well, and should be pleased with the results for their first international exam of this type. The same can be said for the rest of these students, who all passed with flying colours.17 students sat the DELF Scolaire exams run by the Alliance Française Palmerston North, and the region's top scholar belonged to none other than the Home of Champions; Jeanne-Marie Bonnet.

Furthermore, the oral component of the DELF exams also counted towards the Regional Concours Oral for the Manawatu. This is a French speaking competition for Y12 and Y13 students. Both regional winners came from our hallowed halls this year, Brenna Hadley in the Y12 competition and Jeanne-Marie Bonnet in the Y13. These students further competed in the national Concours Oral, competing for 2 free weeks in the

tropical paradise of New Caledonia. These are two very talented students, so watch this space for the national results!

WHAT MADE YOU CHOOSE NEW ZEALAND FOR YOUR EXCHANGE?

I've actually always been really fond of Australia since as long as I can remember. But New Zealand kind of falls in the back of people's minds, they really don't know much about it other than that's where The Hobbit was filmed. I was really interested in its culture, the Maori people, and how similar yet dissimilar it is from the US and its culture and history.

HOW DID YOU GO ABOUT ORGANISING THIS EXCHANGE?

I've been thinking about it since I was about 14, but it's always been a bit over my head, until one day I just sort of said "Mom, I think I want to do an exchange." We looked up how to do an exchange and a lot of different organisations popped up. We looked through them and filtered them out based on price, location, their support and everything in between. I found an organisation called YFU (Youth for Understanding) and I applied. I had to go through an interviewing process with a representative, and they accepted me. I paid for it, and now I'm here. They've been really supportive, and that's basically how I got here.



WHAT WERE YOUR FIRST IMPRESSIONS OF NEW ZEALAND AND WANGANUI HIGH SCHOOL?

It is so green. There is grass everywhere. I'm from Arizona, which is a desert, so it's just dirt and cactus and succulents. Here, there's grass absolutely everywhere, so I was pretty dumbfounded by that. In terms of High School, it was a little bit intimidating with the whole uniform thing. I thought it was going to be much more formal, but now that I'm here I realise it's much more relaxed and much more of a friendly environment than I initially expected.

WHAT ARE THE BIGGEST DIFFERENCES BETWEEN YOUR SCHOOL IN THE USA AND WHS?

I feel like in the States, each class (so here it's year 13, at my school I'm the class of 2017) is a lot more cohesive. By that I mean everybody sort of seeps into different friend groups and cliques, and it just seems like it's a little more 'cliquey' here. That's not necessarily a bad thing, but I feel like everyone stays within their respective groups. Another difference is definitely the athletics. Athletics play a huge role in every person's social life in the United States, and I feel like it's just sort of an embedded American ideal. You also have the influence of college athletics, because you can get your school paid for if you're good enough at your sport. In my school your social life is influenced a whole lot more by what sport you play and what activities you take part in because of the people you're surrounding yourself with.

WHAT HAS BEEN THE BEST PART OF YOUR EXPERIENCE SO FAR?

I've gotten to travel quite a bit. My host brother and sister play hockey, and so they've been playing tournaments all over the North Island. Just being able to go out and see more places and these different areas... even the drives, they've been fantastic.

DO YOU SEE YOURSELF COMING BACK TO NEW ZEALAND AFTER THIS TRIP? WHY?

Absolutely. I'm only here for 5 months, and I don't think that's long enough to see any place. I've really fallen in love with New Zealand as far as I've come, which is only 3 months. The people here, especially, I've met a lot of cool people that I'd definitely like to come back and visit.

WHAT IS ONE THING YOU WOULD SAY TO SOMEONE CONSIDERING DOING AN EXCHANGE LIKE YOURS?

Go for it. Absolutely go for it. Sometimes opportunities come up, once in a lifetime opportunities, and you definitely should take them because it will prove to be one of the best experiences you will ever have and it will sit in your memory as some of the best times you've ever had.

Our one short month in Argentina was a whirlwind of hectic activity. But of course, only the best kind.

Four other Wanganui High school students, (Josh McDermott, Kate Malcolm, Joseph Redpath and Tom Adkins) and I in 2016, with the guidance of Ms Wilkie, the former Head of Spanish at Wanganui High School, happened to find the Argentina Pestalozzi Student Exchange. In doing so, we inadvertently stumbled into one of the greatest experiences of our lives.

It began with five Argentinian strangers walking into Whanganui Airport, and one month later five great friends walking out. It had been an exhilarating month, a true blue kiwi summer and the Argentinians had been hooked. Now it was our turn, and the three weeks in between were the longest wait of our lives.

The most significant part of our exchange was how integrated we were able to be, because we were dropped right within the lives of the people who make Argentina. There was no room in the spectator stands or on the side-lines. We were right in the middle of the match. In the heart of the country, Buenos Aires. Engrossed in the language, the culture and the people. We couldn't help but be swept up in their passion for the 'beautiful game' of soccer; an uproar of forty thousand voices rang out; a battle cry of sorts as their army of soccer players went out to fight. We were swept up in their passion for food, and bewildered as to how a nation could feel so fiercely about grilled beef, their infamous 'asado'. We were swept up in their lifestyle; and the saying proved itself



true, that Buenos Aires never sleeps. At times we felt as if neither did we. We'd eat dinner at ten each night and on weekends go out at ungodly hours of the morning; we'd leave home one morning only to return home at six the next day.

The people were beautiful, welcoming and fiercely of the mind that they were second to none, and that might possibly be true (but perhaps only to be outdone by New Zealanders). The greatest part of the exchange was the bonds we created; between ourselves and our exchange partners, and the friends we'd made. To leave Argentina was heart wrenching, but we left with something irreplaceable; a new home and an appreciation of a culture we'd never suspected we could grow to love so much.

They whooped and yelped, like the little ones when they play their games, their excitement drew the whole village. This was not our only success however, with Gabrielle Penn being awarded the Best Speaker of the tournament, and Gabrielle, Jeanne-Marie and Alister selected as the members of the Central North Island Debating Team (becoming the second year in a row that an all WHS team is selected).

At the Russell McVeagh National Championships in Wellington, these three WHS students unfortunately experienced an incredibly tough draw. We faced the top four teams (Wellington Gold, Wellington Black, Canterbury and Auckland White) in four out of seven preliminary rounds, meaning, with three wins, we

just missed out on breaking into the semis. Over the course of the weekend, we debated motions such as "This house believes that Britain is better off outside the European Union" and "This house believes that international communities should pay developing communities not to extract natural resources". We came away from the tournament with not only amazing memories and experience, but also huge success, with Gabrielle Penn being selected as a Reserve for the New Zealand Debating Team travelling to Germany and Jeanne-Marie Bonnet being selected as a Highly Commended Speaker.

Whilst the junior regional competition is still being fiercely debated (if you'll excuse the pun), our two entered teams (one year nine and one year ten) are showing great skill and potential, both having won two debates and lost one. They have been debating teams such as Fielding High School and Wanganui Girls' College on motions such as "This house believes that Facebook builds communities."

Debating has been a sport whose every aspect I have thoroughly enjoyed, and it has taught me crucial values such as teamwork, commitment and hard work. It has also allowed me constant opportunities to further challenge myself both academically and as a person. Through debating, I have had the opportunity to represent New Zealand at the World Schools Debating Championships in Singapore in 2015 and I would wholeheartedly recommend it as an excellent extra-curricular activity to anyone considering joining.

REGIONAL COMPETITION 2016

We appreciate the whānau support we receive for our students. Special mention to our Raumati whowill be graduating at the end of this year. Thank you for the model example you have set for your juniors and your support of the Māori department in general. Without you, all this wouldn't have been possible and you have represented your school with so much pride. We are proud of you all.

REGIONAL SMOKEFREE





A massive range of music rocked the stage that night which gave students a taste of the feelings you get from live performance and a small insight into the New Zealand music industry.

RockQuest is split into two categories; the solo/duo category and the band category. Whanganui High School achieved highly in both divisions. Unluckily, we didn't take out first or second in the solo/duo category which went to Nga Tawa Diocesan School and Whanganui City College, but the best song of the night went to Jack Southee and Kaleb Lama-Love. Also we had Cookies and Cream (Shaila Hawkins and Abigail Dohare) who weren't too 'shabby' (Shaila + Abby) and we had Rhema Tui who flew in completely solo. A brilliant finish to a memorable Chamber Music season, well done to all our competitors at every level of this contest.
















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PHOTOGRAPHY

Our squad was narrowed down to 14 crew members - 2 coxswains and 12 rowers. Two weeks after NISS, this squad of 14 was accompanied by parent help to Twizel on the 2nd of April for Maadi Cup - New Zealand Secondary Schools. Racing commenced on





Monday the 4th with our squad taking to the water in crews ranging from singles to quads. The week brought many challenges for our team, from sickness to rough and cold weather. But despite this, come finals day on Friday, our small 14-man team had accumulated 7 B grade finals and 6 A grade finals. Young 15 year old, Levi Carroll found himself finishing 6th overall in NZ in the Boys U16 1X. The Boys U18 4X+, being one of the most cut throat events at the regatta, found our crew of Matthew Wright, Nathan Luff, Guy Thomson, Ben Tijsen-Cox and coxswain Rylee Dudley finishing 5th overall in NZ. Nathan Luff put up a fight in the Boys U18 1X to defend his NISS bronze medal. 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

At Whanganui High school the equestrian team is made up of riders from every year group, with the first team being made up of the senior riders Adelaide Hodges, Rebecca Benge, Grace Wright, Clare Cvitanovich and Bailee Baxter. On March 23rd we set off to the Nga Tawa interschool event. Competing in this event for the last 4 years, we had a rough idea of what to expect. However, our expectations were overturned when we learnt that the competition had been opened up to intermediate schools as well as secondary schools, and instead of the usual 30 people we were up against 70-80 riders. With three categories - 80cm, 95cm and 110cm - we had riders competing in each group. It was a tough ride, as we took on the cross country course as well as two show jumping rounds and the freezing cold wet weather made the ground extremely slippery for our horses. Up against strong competitors we didn't place as well as we had hoped, but one of the riders Adelaide Hodges and her horse Rusty Nuts 'n' Bolts pulled off an impressive win in the 95cm speed round and a 7th place in the derby (cross country/show jumping).

Just two weeks later we again set off but this time to

Masterton. We camped overnight keeping our horses in the provided yards. Our parents slept in the horse truck while the 4 riders, (Bailee, Adelaide, Grace and Rebecca) were kicked out into a tent. After a hard day of competing up against 50 or so riders we were unsuccessful in making the top 10 but had some riders come extremely close.

Our last event of the year was the Wanganui interschool which was held down by the race course. This event was run by the RDA and the heights of the fences were smaller so that the younger students could join in. The first class was the presentation class where four riders were chosen to be judged on the cleanliness of their horse and gear. Whanganui High School placed 3rd with the riders in the class, Bailee, Adelaide, Tyler and Rebecca putting in hours of work the day before to make everything clean. We then proceeded to compete in four disciplines, mounted games, show jumping, show hunter and flat classes. After all the competitions, the results were added up and Whanganui High School came out on top.

For most of us, going to sleep at 9pm and waking up at 5am sounds very far-fetched, especially if the sole reason was to drive to the Splash Centre to stare at a black line, or a ceiling, which surprisingly gets a little old after the 22nd lap. Unbelievably, this is the life of most of our High School swimmers, who not only put in hours before school, but just as many hours afterschool, perfecting each and every stroke. Knowing all this, it's no surprise that Whanganui High School excels in swimming competitions, which feature some of the best swimmers in the country. Swimming is one of the most popular, and competitive sports in New Zealand with hundreds of boys and girls choosing to participate in the sport from a young age. In 2016 WHS had 4 national qualifiers, 8 swimmers who qualified for the North Island competition and 7 who qualified for the NZ Secondary School Competition. If you compare the number of people who qualify for these competitions to the amount of swimmers there are in New Zealand, it becomes very clear that the standard of qualification is unbelievably high, yet our swimmers have no problems qualifying and finishing with strong results.

Sarya Lower, who is only a Year 10 student, has shown that in the coming years she has a lot to offer the High School team, beating the 100m freestyle record and the 50m freestyle record with time to spare. This year in the North Island competition, Sarya finished on the podium three times, along with a 5th place in the 100m butterfly. Amelia Cronin-Townsend also got 10th in the 14 and under 200m individual medley, contributing to her rapid improvement since the start of the year. Niamh Hogan gained a 7th place in the 200m backstroke, as well as multiple top ten finishes, whilst Alex Forlong finished 8th in the 15 and over 200m individual medley. Sarya, Niamh, Alex and Elena Forlong managed to a 5th place medley relay result, out of 13 other teams. This only briefly sums up the success which WHS has been able to claim this year, thanks to the hard work all of the swimmers put in outside of school hours.

One swimmer in particular who knows a lot about success is Elena Forlong, who has spent the last 9 years swimming competitively, and in the last 5

vears her hard work and commitment has meant that she's been a force to be reckoned with on a national level. She holds the school record for 50m butterfly and at the recent North Island Secondary Schools Competition, Elena got an overall 3rd in the 50m butterfly, and 2nd in the 100m butterfly. In such a small town like Whanganui, it is incredible to see how Elena consistently reaches the podium in the races she competes in. In the last few years her reputation for being a top 10 finisher has grown, so much so that she has been handpicked to be a part of the Wellington High Performance Squad which is one of the most prestigious swimming squads in New Zealand. For the last 5 years Elena has brought an abundance of success and commitment to Wanganui High School, and although 2016 will be her last year swimming for the school, there is no doubt we will hear her name again soon.

Well done to all of the swimmers this year, you've done our school proud and we can look forward to similar results in 2017!

Over the course of their training, the message that was always hammered was for students to always put their own safety first and try to stay dry. Coming into contact with a conscious person in difficulty in the water is the riskiest thing to ever do, so the students spent time learning to quickly assess the situation, recognise their own capabilities and find the safest way to rescue. All our instincts tell us to leap in and help, but we have to think otherwise to stay safe.




The 2nd XI hockey boys team played very well throughout the season, with a handful of close games and come-from-behind victories. The boys
