When I hear adolescents talking about the Catholic faith they frequently make reference to "the Rules." I am not really sure what they are! Yet, some people becomes engrossed and even repelled by the laws of the Church. However, the best analogy I have for church law is that of the road code. It takes study and attention at the time you learn to drive but once you have your license they fade into the background. Their purpose is achieved when all road users travel safely to their destination. It is the same for us as Catholics. The Canon Law, GIRM (liturgical law) and other rules can be complex however once we have a working knowledge of them it makes our worship, governance and prayer easier and less prone to the equivalent of road accidents. Saint Paul, in his letter of the Galatians, uses the analogy for the law of the guardian who escort the children on their way to school. The reality of our faith, as we hear in the Second Reading is always greater than any set of laws or rules: "But we speak God's wisdom, secret and hidden, which God decreed before the ages for our glory." (1 Cor. 2: 7) The last canon of the 1983 Code of Canon Law says it well when it states: "canonical equity is to be observed, and the salvation of souls, which must always be the supreme law in the Church, is to be kept before one's eyes." (c. 1752) (Fr Marcus)

Kia ora tātou As the new year picks up in rhythm and pace, I wish to draw your attention to the first edition of WelCom for this year. There is wide coverage of news from our Diocese. I learned a lot – from the making of the life size nativity set at St Joseph's Shannon (in our most southern parish) to the now 70th annual pilgrimage from Wairoa (our most northern parish) to the Carmelites Sisters in Auckland. There's news of Suzanne Aubert, an excellent piece on how the Lectionary (our cycle of readings) works, a fascinating history of Te Wairoa parish and Tawhiti A Maru marae, news from St John's College and New Plymouth parish and much more. I have written a piece called Faith, Politics and Elections. It's not about party politics; more a topical framework that stands behind politics. Make a coffee and enjoy the reading! Next Week's Reading: SEVENTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR

Leviticus 19:1-2, 17-18; 1 Corinthians 3:16-23; Matthew 5:38-48

Next week, the first reading from Leviticus has Moses telling the Israelites that, if they're going to imitate God's goodness, they need to live lives based on a value system that's different from the one people round them live by. There's no room for hate, revenge, grudges. **Love** has to be the order of the day. *'You shall not hate.....you shall not take vengeance or bear a grudge.....you shall love your neighbour as yourself.'* In the gospel, Matthew's Jesus goes further and points out some practical implications for a life based on love or 'hesed', to use the Hebrew word. 'Hesed' refers to what an individual does for someone else which goes beyond what that person has a right to expect. *'Love your enemies..... pray for those who persecute you....'* Jesus says. He is telling us that one way we can imitate God's goodness is by freely doing things which we have no responsibility or obligation to do. Of course, that is likely to make us rather different from most of the people round us and it will almost certainly be a challenge because we prefer blending in with the crowd. But if we're serious about living in a real relationship with God, then we can't avoid standing out. *'If you love those who love you.....do not even the tax collectors do the same? And if you greet only your brothers and sisters.....do not even the Gentiles do the same?'* If we're really committed to following Christ, we can't avoid being different, different in ways that'll change the world in which we live. On the other hand, if we just relate to people and do things in the same old way that everyone else does, no one will even notice what the writers of Scripture mean by God's holiness. JB Kendall rsj
