THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

It was great to get the College started this year! After a few weeks of constant issues preceding the start of school we managed to stagger over the line and get school started on time. Unfortunately, the now infamous vinyl flooring is still holding up the demolition programme and could take at least another week to remove so we are now four weeks behind schedule. Hopefully, progress will be more positive over the remainder of the vear, as we need the final rebuild to be completed before the NZQA examinations in November 2017 (as the new facility will be our Examination Centre). Thank you to everyone in our community for your support over this testing time.

The academic review of the 2016 NCEA results has highlighted levels of achievement never seen before. It is very humbling to see 98.5% pass rates at NCEA Level 1, 97% at NCEA Level 2 and 100% at Level 3. I did a quick analysis and 150 out of 153 senior students with a full course achieved their qualification. The result was quite staggering and should be celebrated and enjoyed as these statistics represent the highest levels of achievement in our history. Well done to all the students, parents, staff and iwi who have contributed to this result.

Quite unusually, I have had to employ a significant number of new teachers for 2017. As a result, Mrs Caitriona Davies (Science & Physics), Mrs Sophie Hart (Performing Arts & English), Ms Christine England (Food Technology) and Mrs Erica Duggan (Computing) have joined the teaching staff. Mrs Debra Benefield is also on staff this term covering Ms Helen Dougherty who is on sabbatical, while Ms Alicia Prince is with us for Term One as Sports Coordinator. We are very lucky to have these staff in the College and each has strengths that will benefit our students. I am looking forward to their contribution in 2017 and I wish them well.

As I write this newsletter item we have just completed our Missioning Mass. It was nice to have our new parish priest, Fr. Marcus Francis, preside over the Mass where we welcomed 70 new Year 9 students and a handful of students at other levels. The new student leadership team was also "missioned" at the Mass and I look forward to seeing the new leadership model in action. I know the change in leadership model has confused some in our community but hopefully the role of our student leaders will become clearer for you as the year progresses. In simplistic terms the model focuses on leadership as 'service' rather than position. The life and witness of Jesus has been the inspiration behind this change.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge those in our community who have lost loved ones recently. In particular, our prayers and love go out to the Manuel whanau who lost Raniera and Whetumarama only a few weeks apart, while Miss Goldsworthy lost her cherished mum, Sue Baldwin and the Rawhiri whanau lost their cherished nan, Ngarama O Te Ao Hawira. THE NURSES STATION

School Based Health Services

Kia ora, my name is Samantha Hoyle. I am a Public Health Nurse based at the Public Health Centre at Whanganui Hospital and employed by the Whanganui District Health Board. I am providing the School Based Health Services at Cullinane College. My role is to provide free health services to all students. A specific health and wellbeing assessment (HEEADSSS) is offered for Year 9 students. A brochure (School Based Health Services) would have been sent out prior to school starting. This health assessment will provide Year 9 students with the opportunity to individually meet with a nurse to talk about things that may affect their health and wellbeing and, thereby, their learning.

The HEEADSSS assessment will include hearing and vision screening, blood pressure, weight, height, and social wellbeing conversations. This assessment is intended to support learning, school performance and positive youth development for all students. If health or social issues are identified the student will be supported to address the issues. If you do not wish

your child to receive this assessment or have any questions please feel free to contact me.

I will be available at the school Monday afternoons and Thursday mornings. Services available through this clinic include health information, advice and assessments and referral to other services and/or agencies.
