

But all together, they have become the heart and muscles and mind of something perilous and new, something strange and growing and great. Together, all together, they are the instruments of change."

This quotation from Keri Hulme's 'The Bone People' epitomises an ideal I had as the Year 11 Dean for 2017. I presented this in one of the earliest assemblies and reiterated the idea that for the year group to evolve, and make the transition from being juniors in Year 10 to maturing Year 11's, then a sense of comradery needed to be sought after. For me, this 'togetherness' has been worked on over the course of the year with the Year 11 Pastoral Team, comprising of Mr Friedel and Mrs Spooner, the dedicated Year 11 Form teachers, the Form class Representatives, and the Year 11 cohort.

Year 11 is the year of transition. It is the first year on the NCEA path, and for most students, it is the first year of sitting examinations. It is the year when individuals can sit their drivers' licence, can attend vocational courses, leave home, and it is the year students can legally leave school. In this modern world of technology, cyberbullying has become rampant, and in the hands of young people dealing with their emotions, developing maturity, and establishing themselves in this world, the fallout can be devastating and everlasting. I hope that people, young and old, realise that technology is a tool that can be used for good, and yet, it can be turned off. Young people today don't experience silence enough. There is always a television on, music blaring, ear plugs in, phone in hand...the benefits of silence and the quiet thinking time it brings needs to be instilled and a balance found.

Our Year 11 cohort have had many successes, too many to name individually here. We have had successes in the sporting arena with our runners, rowers, footballers, basketballers, rugby players (just to mention a few). Well, here it is. After 5 fantastic years working with this year group, it's time for you to move on and in to the real world.



The United World College movement prides itself on accepting students who 'do life differently'. Therefore, it seems somewhat ironic that my pursuit of a United World College Scholarship came not from my own discovery of the award, but rather, my following in the footsteps of our previous Head Girl, Pratibha Singh. However, it is certainly fitting that this was the way in which 'the rest of my life began'. Perhaps the greatest gift I have received from Whanganui High School has been the vast number of students to look up to, to admire, and ultimately, to learn from.

I look back fondly on the senior students who were my first coaches in my early days as a debater, the girls in the year above that consoled and guided me as I sat terrified through an accelerated academic course, and the older players in the football team who coddled and encouraged me as a footballer and a person. I admired those students, considered them friends, and I presume, in a way, later fulfilled the role in someone else's life that they had in mine. My sincere hope for every student entering our school is that they too find, and become, mentors like this. I have been proud to be one of your Head Girls for Whanganui High School in 2017. I cannot communicate how grateful I have been for the many forms of help and guidance I have received in this role. The support of Mr McAllen and Mrs Langrish, as well teachers and staff and all members of the school community remains a powerful reminder to me of how to be a good, and more importantly, kind, leader and person. ISAK – as we call it – may be a prestigious secondary school and United World College campus in Japan, but Whanganui High School is no less capable, no less passionate and no less saturated with talent. This is a piece of knowledge I carry with me gladly.

I have one final hope for the future of our school, and fittingly, it is one stolen from a previous head student who was something of a role model to me.

The main event of senior debating for 2017 was the Central North Island Russell McVeagh Debating Championship, and for the first time in years, we were at home, debating at WHS, rather than driving to and from Palmerston North each day. While this did not aid in the attempt to bring the trophy home again, it allowed a number of impressive teams to take part. These ranged from our veterans Boston

Flanagan-Connors and Alister Hughes third and fourth Russell McVeagh regional competitions respectively; the second competition for Raoul Sarup; and the competition debut of promising younger teams comprised of a mixture of Year Eleven students, Emelye Brown and Abigail Martin and Year Ten students Katja Mokha, Aranga Molijn, Leah Aiono, and Callista Booth-Richards.

Despite the variety of experience, there was no difference in how much the teams enjoyed the competition. After the initial settling in period, getting used to the idea of speaking for up to 6 minutes just half an hour after being given topics - such as lowering the voter age, social and economic public policy, and even the idea of taxing sports teams - it became second nature. Though results were a mixed bag - not breaking into the top two teams to compete in the final was slightly disappointing for the debaters who would be saying goodbye to Whanganui High School at the end of this year - there is little doubt there will be success in the future. The experience gained for next year's teams was invaluable.

Though team results eluded us, Alister Hughes did have individual success, following in Gabrielle Penn's footsteps in being named the Best Speaker at the tournament, and going on to represent the Central North Island at the Russell McVeagh National Championships once more. Unfortunately, the CNI team - Alister, with two members from Palmerston North Girls' High School - came up



against an exceptionally tough draw in facing the team that would go on to win the competition, and then narrowly losing on two occasions to the team that would eventually finish as runners up of the tournament.

Despite this, debating motions such as 'This house would bestow the rights of personhood onto certain higher animals,' or 'This house believes that the USA should stop selling arms to Saudi Arabia,' led to a weekend of amazing memories and further success for WHS Debating. Alister was selected as a reserve for the New Zealand team which travelled to

Bali - placing him in the top eight school debaters in New Zealand - a testament to his debating roots at Whanganui High.



A group of over fifty students all gathered in the Whanganui Girls' College hall for the Annual Model United Nations General Assembly, where we were given an opportunity to represent different countries and their views as we discussed, dressed to impress, whipped up a storm in the kitchen to create some delicacy from our designated country and fought for our country's voice to be heard.

The day began with speeches introducing the countries and their delegates. 




TOKARARANGI POA winner of the 2017 Wallace Secondary Schools Art Award Print titled: The Descendants of Paikea


LEVEL TWO AND THREE HISTORY

Over the last few years, we have been celebrating the centenary of many of the shaping moments of New Zealand's history throughout the First World War. 2017 was no exception. July 31st this year marked the one hundredth anniversary of the Battle for Passchendaele; the days where more New Zealand blood was spilt in conflict than at any other time in history. It made it a particularly auspicious year to be studying History; a unique opportunity to study an event that, so often, is overlooked. This was set to change.

It was apparent that this had to be given the attention that it deserved throughout the year, and often it's said that the best way to study something is through full immersion. Usually with history, we cannot do this. Where can we travel to become fully immersed in another time? How can we transcend a century? Apparently, we can travel to Wellington and visit 'The Great War Exhibition' curated by Peter Jackson as a testament to the First World War and worked on by Weta Workshop. So, a group of year 12 and 13 students took a field trip to Wellington to visit this; guided around by one of the key members of the Museum Team, gaining incredible insight and understanding of everything that occurred a century ago. That same day we were also lucky enough to be taken through lectures by historians who have made this particular period of history - especially Passchendaele - their key area of study.

We finished the day with a commemorative ceremony at the National War Memorial in Wellington; beginning at the Tomb of the Unknown Warrior, before moving inside where Jackie Hazelhurst laid a wreath on behalf of our school and Alister Hughes recited the Ode to The Fallen. The atmosphere and solemnity of the occasion and surroundings, despite it being such a glorious day, reinforced just how important it is to remember the sacrifices made. It was an opportunity that we could have had nowhere else.

In conjunction with our studies on Passchendaele, we were also lucky enough to be visited by Professor Glynn Harper from Massey University, who is a leading authority and published author on the Battle of Passchendaele. He delivered a series of lectures and workshops over the course of the day for Level Two and Three students. They were invaluable.

ELAINE P. SNOWDEN ASTROMOMY SCHOOL

THE UNIVERSITY OF CANTERBURY

Not many of you would have gone to school during the Easter/school holidays, but one of the talented students from Whanganui High School did. It was not our school - not even in the same city or on the same island

I was merely one of twenty year 12/13 students from New Zealand selected from over one hundred applicants to take part in the course run by the Elaine P. Snowden Astronomy School. We were chosen on the basis of our passion for astronomy and academic achievements. Upon being selected I went down to Christchurch between the 18th and 23rd of April to spend six days as a 'temporary' astronomy student at the University of Canterbury. Being hosted by the University of Canterbury in Christchurch, I got some insight into my future years of study. The sponsor, Michael Snowden, named the school in memory of his mother.

Basically, the trip was about astronomy. In a more broad sense, about what stars are made of and their so called 'music'(asteroseismology), extrasolar planets, gravitational microlensing, the universe, its scale, observing it, and more.

The other participants and I spent four days on the

University of Canterbury's

campus, attending interesting lectures, exciting workshops, and informative tours. We also had the chance to construct a refractor telescope, examine atomic emission spectra, and, as many of the others did, enjoy a late night 'Maccas' run.

This was followed by two nights at the Mount John Observatory near Tekapo. The Mount John Observatory is home to five large telescopes, of which I got to operate the 1-metre McLellan Telescope and the 0.6-metre Boller & Chivens Telescope. I used them to observe nebulae, like the Tarantula Nebula, Cat's Paw Nebula, and Crab Nebula. Both nights had less than desirable temperatures, requiring me to wear at least four layers of clothing, yet the view was beyond "stellar". As an added bonus we enjoyed the Digital Dome Planetarium near Mt Cook.

I took many things away from this trip, not only an amazing experience and great friendships built with like-minded people but a more developed passion for astronomy and science (plus a free t-shirt and cap).


1976 TO 2017

It was further embedded by a Girls' Brigade trip to Singapore towards the end of her time at Colenso. Her interest in tramping was inspired by her father, who tramped in the Southern Alps while at Otago University. Edmund Hillary's climb of Everest in 1953 saw a surge in interest in the outdoors and Claire followed her father into multi day trips in the Kawekas while they were both at Colenso High School. She met her husband at Massey University in the early seventies and married in 1973. They headed off around the world in February 1976, after completing their Science degrees and Teaching Diplomas and having worked for a year at Kuranui College, Greytown to bankroll their trip. They flew to Singapore, then by road and rail through Malaysia and Thailand, flying over Burma because it was in one of its ongoing civil wars. They arrived in Kathmandu to trek for two weeks in the Himalayas. Back from the trek they caught a bus to Delhi, India and then a train to Peshawa, Pakistan. They hitchhiked through Afghanistan, then it was back to buses for the trip through Iran and Turkey. A boat trip to Corfu and another to Brindisi, Italy was followed by more hitchhiking, a train through France and yet another boat ride to England.

England, Wales and Southern Ireland were explored by bicycle before returning to New Zealand in August 1976. While visiting relatives in Whanganui,



Claire's first trip to the High School Lupton Hut was in the winter of 1977. She took time out to have a family 1978 - 1982, although the children were introduced to the hut and tramping as soon as they could walk. 1983/4 saw a leave of absence from High School while her husband taught at Tonga High School in Nuku'alofa.

Returning to Whanganui in 1985 saw Claire doing relief teaching at various schools in Whanganui and going on the odd tramp with the Whanganui High School Tramping Club. She returned to Whanganui High staff in the late 1990's teaching Mathematics and Human Biology and moved fully into Mathematics a short time later. A key member of the High School Tramping Club, she helped organise multiday end of year trips to Nelson Lakes, Abel Tasman, St James Walkway, round Ruapehu, Kaweka and many day and overnight trips to Ruapehu, the Ruahines and Tararuas. She oversaw Bronze, Silver and Gold Duke of Edinburgh Expeditions and became the Award Co-ordinator for Whanganui High School, with many hundreds of students getting Bronze and Silver Awards and at least 78 getting Gold Level Awards. Yearly visits to Government House became the norm and she even managed to get her own older children presented by the Duke of Edinburgh himself!!. It is not every family that can say this or that all of their children achieved the Gold Standard. Claire developed the CNZ course for Robert

No light shines through anymore, The trees are overgrown, Blocking out the hope, The warmth, The wind, The air, The darkness overrules.


But in the darkness, Shadows move: Ravens caw, Silhouettes run, And in it's own way, it is alive.

If you'd told us five years ago, as we set out on our first Duke of Edinburgh expedition up the mountain, that we would be canoeing over 145km from Taumaranui to Pipiriki over the course of four days, we might have laughed at you. It seems such a long time ago that we started on this journey, but for those of us on the 2017 Whanganui River Trip, it was the last time we would be doing something like this with the school.

Day One: Taumaranui to Poukaria

Our first day on the water began with an early start so we could shuttle to our starting point at Taumaranui where we would begin this epic journey, and it was certainly a day to remember. This was a day of thrill seeking as most of us had not spent any prolonged time on the river and so we spent most of the morning chasing any rapids we could find. I'm not sure how many times the question, 'At the rock, or around it?' was answered with a laugh and a direction to head straight for it. It was a mixture of the novelty and gorgeous weather that had been brought out for us, but this kept us busy for most of the morning until we finally got what we deserved, ending up with an involuntary swim. This was when we decided that, actually, rapid chasing mightn't be the wisest plan if we wanted to get anywhere; especially with 35.5km to get through over the course of the day.

and a cold river beckoning there was really only one option. We spent most of the evening swimming and chasing the sun for as long as we could, before eventually calling it quits and cooking up a storm for whatever was on the menu that night. We ended up turning in relatively early; this was only the first night of a long trip after all.

Dav Two: Poukaria to Ohauora

Where yesterday had turned out beautiful blue skies and a baking sun, today's weather was decidedly average; even if it was pleasant enough. Maybe it was the knowledge that we had over 47km to get through that day, or that it would take decidedly longer to dry off if we did end up in the water, or that we were starting to feel the effects of yesterday on our muscles, but we had a much more subdued start to this day's paddle.

This just turned into a long day with little else to do but keep paddling, and paddling, and paddling, before paddling some more. The long periods of slow water made for tough progress, but they also let us appreciate some of the most beautiful scenery that we had ever seen. The drop scene and serenity of it all were just ways to escape into the moment, away from everything that was waiting for us at home. We passed the hours, sometimes chatting, sometimes not - always paddling - just embracing the moment and before long the day had whiled away and we realised that we were much closer to the campsite than we would have thought. We soon pulled into Ohauora Campsite, our second home of the trip.

That evening was much colder than the night before, and perhaps that was why most of the sane people on our trip forwent the evening swim after pitching tents and setting up camp for the night; Jackie and I still braved it though. Crazy enough to swim and continue the tradition that we started on our last tramp - the Queen Charlotte Track - where we swam every night, whatever the weather. It's surprising how invested you can be in making small talk when it is the only chance of distracting you from the freezing water that you're about to be diving into.

Despite this interruption, it turned into a remarkably relaxing night. We went through the now familiar motions of cooking dinner on camp stoves and saving any hot water left over for drinks after dinner, before spending the night comparing notes with our guide on everywhere we had visited, and just getting to know anyone that we were spending the next few days with that we mightn't have known before now; not that any of us were really strangers after being on at least one tramp at some point or other with them. It was one of those nights that you see in movies, with everyone sitting around chatting with torches and hot drinks, before crawling into tents; one that sums up the Duke of Edinburgh experience.

Day Three: Ohauora to Tieke

The third day's paddling was much the same as before; a mixture of rapids and still water. Paddling and drifting. Chatting and not. We finally seemed to have paddling down pat, making good time, and getting through the day's landmarks in reasonable time. It was a reasonable day, though the coldest that we had had since starting the trip.

Part way through the day we took a pit stop at the Bridge to Nowhere - the iconic Whanganui walk that none of us had done before - where we took the chance to stretch the legs after finally making it onto solid ground. There was a small hitch in the plans as a couple of us sank into the thigh deep mud upon getting out of the canoes which left us in the dilemma of where, exactly, to beach the canoes to get out; but hey, it's got to have been good for our skin right?

After the walk, we just kept going. Alternating between chatting or enjoying the scenery or bickering or chatting or bickering, but all the while paddling and making pretty good time to get to the final stop of our Duke of Edinburgh career at Tieke campsite. Here, after we had all had a quick dip in the river, we were treated to a powhiri and welcomed onto the campsite marae by the warden. We then shared our experiences with a mixture of people from China, the Netherlands and the UK.

That night, knowing we weren't going to have that much to get through the next day, we took our time setting up tents and making our last dinner on Duke of Edinburgh, sharing memories and having a laugh. It was slightly bittersweet, knowing that we weren't going to have an experience like this again,

but it was still an incredible night. Stargazing; making the most of the incredibly clear night that had come out for us before, once again, crawling into our tents sometime early that morning.

Final Day: Tieke to Home (via Pipiriki)

There wasn't much fuss that day. We went through the now familiar motions of packing our tents and loading the canoes, before getting onto the water for the final leg of the day. We loved every moment of it, glad to be heading home, but also not quite ready to be going home to normality.

This was the day that had been built up for us. We were set to face the biggest rapid of the trip, so excited, but also slightly apprehensive, we made our way to the final bend. Prepared now, both physically and emotionally. But, with the water levels not quite what it needed to be, the 'mega rapid' was turned into 'slightly quicker water than usual;' not properly showing. So slightly gutted, (but also, I think, a little bit glad to be staying dry) we made it to the boat ramp to beach our canoes for the last time, and unload them as we waited for our shuttle.

It was strange that night, being so glad to be home, but just not quite ready to say goodbye to the river. There is something about its ability to wash everything else away and let us forget anything and everything that was quite magical. However it did it, it was an experience that we were all so glad to make the last, and best, of many memories of the Duke of Edinburgh expeditions at Whanganui High School. It remains to say a big thank you to Mr Adams for everything that he did over the course of that trip and for putting up with us over those four days.

There will always be a place,


On the bookshelf,

Duke of Edinburgh Gold

Day 1 - 4th December (4.5km)

Today we had an early start at 6am. We left our Camp Elsdon cabins in Porirua at 7:15 a.m ready to leave for the interislander ferry. After taking some pictures and checking in our packs, we boarded the ferry and began to explore. After taking more photos on the top deck, a group of us relocated to the cafe and had some hot drinks. We then spent some time in Picton and boarded the mail boat to head to Ship's Cove. We stayed on the top deck and the journey was amazing. We also stopped at otuara Island for a walk and saw lots of wildlife such as native birds, skinks and my personal favourite blue penguins. Once we reached Ship's Cove we walked for one and a half hours to Schoolhouse Bay Campsite. After all the excitement of putting up our tents (the ground was very hard so we struggled to put the pegs in!), some people decided to brave the icy cold water but we decided to have a hot chocolate instead.

Day 2 - 5th December (22km)

Today it was really lovely to wake up to the beautiful view of the water right outside our tents. Our walking group was the first to leave Schoolhouse Bay Campsite at 7:10 a.m. We then had quite an up and down walk to Furneaux Lodge. We sat on the lawn and had some lunch. We then had a look

around the lodge, ordered some food (chips and iced chocolate) and spoke to the Dutch owners. They told us their tips for the track ahead and shared some interesting stories with us. Then we set off again. The walk started off well as by then we had fully woken up and my muscles had warmed up. However, after a while the pressure and the friction of our boots began to REALLY hurt my feet. We tried to brave the pain but when we were one hour away from the campsite, we had to stop to tape our feet. As we were walking, we came across many lodges with spas and tourists having a relaxing holiday but we had to push onwards to our home for the next few nights... tents. Once we reached Camp Bay, we quickly got changed, had a very refreshing swim and had lots of fun jumping off the jetty! There was lots of aquatic life such as starfish, sea urchins and iellyfish. We then went back and heated up our Back Country meals for dinner - this time they were quite good as we didn't add as much water.

Day 3 - 6th December (23km)

Today we had a bit of a late start and left Camp Bay at 7:30 a.m. The walk up to the ridgeline was quite steep and I struggled a little. Once we reached the ridgeline the track became quite flat and the views of the sounds were breathtaking! We stopped at Bay of many Coves Campsite for lunch (salami, wraps and some much needed chocolate). After lunch the sun had come out and







it was very hot, the clear blue water looked very tempting! We continued on and came to a point in the track where we could choose to go to the Eatwells Lookout over the Queen Charlotte Sound. It was extremely steep but luckily we left our packs at the bottom. The hike up was well worth it as the view was absolutely incredible! We also met some locals (wekas). On the track we saw the effects of the recent earthquake in Kaikoura as there were a few landslides and cracks in the ground. Once we reached Cowshed Campsite, we quickly put up our tents (as we thought it was going to rain) and I had quite a refreshing cold shower to wash off the past two days - it was well worth the long wait in line!

Day 4 - 7th December (20.5km)

Today we woke up at the earlier time of 5:50 a.m. so our group was able to leave the campsite first. It was another steep walk up to the road to begin with but luckily it only took 10 minutes. The first part of the journey to Te Mahia was quite hard for me as the severe ups and downs were extremely painful for my feet (lots of blisters). The good thing was that all the groups were able to make it to the lunch site in under four hours, which Mr Adam said he had never been able to do with groups on the past WHS trips. After lunch, we set off for Davies Bay in high spirits as we knew we only had around three hours to go. After about one and a half hours, it began to drizzle a little and three people

(including myself) began to fall behind. Two others began to race ahead as they were keen to reach the campsite, which made the group dynamics slightly strained. We reached the campsite quite early (3:15 p.m.) and put up our tents very fast due to the rain. For dinner, we had a Back Country meal - Mexican chicken and it was by far the best meal I'd had in the last few days! We played card games such as UNO which helped everyone get to know each other.

Day 5 - 8th December (1km)

Today we had to wake up even earlier (at 5:30 a.m.) as it was the last day and we had to travel home. My tent group were slow to get ready so we ended up being rushed and quite flustered. We were chosen by Mr Adam to lead everyone for the 45 minute walk to Anakiwa - we weren't too happy about this as we were worried our pace would be too slow for some but it went well and we reached Anakiwa a little before 7 a.m. All of us jumped off the jetty in celebration and it was an amazing feeling to have accomplished the 71 kilometre Queen Charlotte Track. We then dried off and caught the mail boat back to Picton and then rushed and boarded the earlier Interislander at 9 a.m. The journey back to the North Island was fairly uneventful and we played cards for most of the time. We then piled into the vans and drove back home to Whanganui!










Individual Peer Mentoring took off with an explosion this year. Having only envisaged about 20 mentees and 20 mentors to be involved in 2017, the need for one-to-one mentors totally exceeded all expectations, as well as the number of pupils who signed up to become a mentor (100 plus).

After Term One it became very apparent that one person co-ordinating over 150 pupils was unsustainable. So two Heads of Individual Peer Mentoring were appointed - Elly Douglas and Danielle Bourne to help run the various groups of mentors. The diverse jobs of the mentors range from reading and academic to general support and manning a drop-in room every first break for any pupil in need to have contact with a mentor.

To give the mentors more support and direction, six senior mentors were then assigned to each lead a group. The senior mentors were Joanie De Villiers, Kobe Titter, David Mosen, Kavah Safaei Torogh, Misty Tutaki and Daniel Sewelle.

This has been a year of trial and error where the ideas of the mentors and mentees to improve the system have been listened to and acted on. All the pupils in leadership roles have led and developed their job description the way they deemed best for the pupils in their care and the school. Only pupils that did their mentoring job well and consistently were rewarded with recognition of a badge, so all earned the right to wear it with pride.

A big thank you to all the pupils involved as you have totally blown me away with your professionalism, enthusiasm and care for the person that you were given to mentor.

Having a mentor is not a weakness; it is purely someone who is in your corner with no hidden agenda, who will help, guide and be there for you whenever and wherever needed.







After an early morning Easter Egg hunt, our tour took a deviation along Highway 99 to the historic Clifden Bridge before returning to Queenstown for the flight home to the River City.

The group conducted themselves so well. New friendships were made, lifelong mental photos were stored and hopefully some Geography knowledge was ingrained there as well.

For students who have taken Geography over the past couple of years, Year 13 usually involves a trip of great expense, adventure and fun. So, when we embarked on our two period journey out to Castlecliff Beach, the students could barely contain their excitement. The trip was to prepare them for their internal assessment on Coastal Research. The major trip for this year was a four night expedition to Mount Maunganui, where students learnt about all three of their external standards and their internal standard on whether or not the area should be developed. 21 students participated in various activities, although only four brave people had a dip at Kerosene Creek. They included a day up to Rainbow's End exploring Tourism, The Mount Hot Pools and base and summit walks, a spot of ten pin bowling and a drive along Marine Parade examining the temporal changes. Whilst the weather was a bit rough on the Saturday, this enabled the students to complete school tasks and develop flash cards. 2018 will see a return to the Gold Coast in early June.

The 2017 production. What can I say? Rock of Ages rocked, simple as that.




I bleed. Melting onto other's shoes around me. I watch, every time he falls whispering, 'Get up boy. Goddamnit. Get up. Just one more time."


My eyes swell and burn.







the decile four school in small town Whanganui - is partnered with different schools all over the globe; just another example of how incredible our school is. This means that, at different times, we are lucky enough to host visiting students from these schools for two week periods as part of our buddy system when they are exploring New Zealand. Schools such as Toyooka (Japanese), Xuzhou (Chinese) and Indraprastha (India) spend two weeks here at Whanganui High School taking part in classes, going on trips and experiencing the school's culture. They stay with host families during the two weeks and are each partnered with a student or "buddy" from Whanganui High School. They spend breaks with these buddies and have some of the same classes with them. These buddies are in charge of ensuring that the visitors get to each of their classes on time and then are handed over to their host families. By being a buddy, you are able to join in on some of the special classes that the visiting students take, such as Cookery,

The students are also given many opportunities outside the school curriculum, such as going on trips to Mt Ruapehu, jet boating down the Whanganui River, and swimming at the Splash Centre (and for the Xuzhou students participating in a school trip to Palmerston North with the junior Whanganui High school Students studying Chinese). For their last day, the schools prepare a presentation of their culture for the buddies and host families. The students from Indraprastha performed traditional songs and dances for the Year 10 assembly, while the Toyooka students taught lessons in origami and gave a presentation through traditional Japanese storytelling.

Every day we attended school with our partners. Often helping out in English classes or braving Statistics in Spanish. The school was much smaller than ours, having only 1500 students from kindergarten through to Year 13. Making friends with the juniors who were so enthusiastic to speak English is one of my favourite memories.

When we weren't in school we were taken on trips to explore the city. There are around 4 million people in Buenos Aires so there was always something to do. One of the stand out neighbourhoods was La Boca. The colourful area is a slum turned into a tourist destination. We visited El Cementerio de la Recoleta, a famous cemetery where Eva Perón is buried. The cemetery's tombs often hold families and are so large it feels as though you're walking through a small town. On April 25th we were invited to commemorate ANZAC day at the Australian Embassy. This was a special experience as we realised that we were surrounded by Kiwis and home was never really too far away.

A few of us were fortunate enough to escape the bustle of the big city with a visit to the magical Iguazú falls - the largest waterfall system in the world - on the border of Argentina and Brazil. After a 16 hour bus ride,the rest of us found ourselves in Colonia, Uruguay. The small town is very popular amongst Argentinians as it is only an hour by the ferry across el Río de la Plata.

Living in such a big city where they spoke a different language meant we found ourselves in some funny situations. A couple of us never learnt that when we ordered coffee we had to say "con leche" or the coffee would come black. We never got over the lack of salt on everything, including chips. For those of us who have never studied Spanish "Hablas Ingles?" became our favourite phrase.

Over the course of a month we all gained a few kilos from all the ice cream we ate, gained knowledge of a new culture and gained a newfound appreciation of language, salt on fries, the beautiful place we call home and the amazing opportunities, such as this exchange, we have presented to us here in New Zealand.



OCATIONAI STUDIES DEPARTMENT

THIS IS A MULTI-FACETED **DEPARTMENT SET UP TO PROVIDE MANY OF OUR SENIOR STUDENTS WITH** THE SKILLS AND EXPERIENCE THAT LOCAL EMPLOYERS ARE SEEKING WHEN RECRUITING.

The main aim is to prepare our students for employment using:

- Work Experience whilst still at school
- Courses outside the School one or more davs a week
- The facilitation of permanent full-time jobs **EXTERNAL COURSES**

THIS YEAR, OVER 130 STUDENTS HAVE **BEEN INVOLVED IN COURSES OUTSIDE THE SCHOOL. THESE MIGHT** HAVE BEEN ONE-DAY COURSES, OR ONE-DAY-A-WEEK-ALL-YEAR COURSES.

They included:

Apiculture, Business Enterprise, Applied Technology and Design, Hair & Beauty, Automotive, Construction, Health, Hospitality, Early Childhood Education, Agriculture, Red Shirts (Retail), SiteSafe, Forklift Safety, Active Careers. Many of these courses were held at UCOL Whanganui or UCOL Palmerston North, but other providers included Ag Challenge, Taratahi, Training for You, and SiteSafe.

WORK EXPERIENCE PLACEMENTS

OUR DEPARTMENT OFFERS WORK EXPERIENCE WITHIN THREE PROGRAMMES:

1. Vocational Studies incorporating the Gateway **Programme**

These students have two Career Days where they are out of school. One day is spent attending External Courses and the other experiencing "the world of work". During this time, students are actively engaged with local businesses gaining

invaluable work experience. The other three days students come to school attending classes in English, Maths, Food Technology, Health and Employment Skills.

2. Vocational Skills Programme

This short-term programme allows any student from the senior school to gain a taste of working in their chosen Vocational Pathway. Approved students are granted permission to spend one day per week in the work force with a suitable local employer for maybe six to eight weeks.

3. Employer Request Programme

Occasionally the school is contacted by local employers who are wanting to recruit a school leaver. After liaising with various parties, we send these students out on short-term work experience which allows employers time to judge whether the student is suitable. This often leads to full-time employment.

We monitor all students in their work places by daily attendance phone checks, and regular workplace visits by our Employment Coordinator.

This year we have had nearly 100 students volunteering at an amazing array of local businesses.

Every year the NZCT Chamber Music Competition, organised by Chamber Music New Zealand is held in June. Students from years 9 to 13, in groups of three to eight, can enter and perform one or more pieces of classical music from four to fifteen minutes in length. The contest took place in the Prince Edward Auditorium of Whanganui Collegiate School, and was split into three sessions. it for us. I hope in the future more students will participate in this amazing event, and I look forward to seeing more musicians involved next year.



How long have you been involved in sport at WHS and the position as Director of Sport?

I have been working as the WHS Sport Co-ordinator/ Director of Sport since 1993 - 24 years ago. When I was appointed to the position, I was at the time working in the Careers Department as well as aiding in the PE Department working with the Head of Department, the late Mrs Eunice Mahoney. In 1993, Mr Mark Quigley took over the reins and was looking for a Sport Co-ordinator to manage sport within the school as he wanted to focus solely on PE. As I had previous experience and a passion to see young people participate in sport, I applied for and was appointed in the position. I continued to work in the Careers position as well, as I really enjoyed the balance both jobs gave me.

How has sport changed over the years?

The biggest change would have to be the difference in lifestyle and students opting out of participating in sport. When I first started working as Sport Co-ordinator, there wasn't the variety of sports to play as there is now. There were the traditional ones; Rugby, Netball, Football, Hockey and Basketball in the winter, and Rowing, Cricket and Athletics in summer. Now we offer more than 34 sports so the opportunities for participation and sporting code choices have definitely grown. Part-time jobs, pressure of academic studies, and I guess just a faster pace of life have meant that students have to juggle and prioritise their time more than they did 23 years ago. Technology has also meant that you can easily get enjoyment out of just watching sport, as many popular sports are now broadcast live and you can follow them without leaving the comfort of your home!

Has the culture in sport changed over the years?

Initially when I thought of this question I would have said "Yes, definitely school sporting culture has changed", but on reflection it probably hasn't. If you have the passion, desire and support from family and friends, then the answer is" No, it's very much the same". Sport at school is still very important as it sorts you out as a person. To become good at what you do, you need a lot of self discipline, self belief and to be organised. This positivity usually reflects in students' behaviour in the classroom, too. From my personal experience, having been in many teams throughout my life, my fondest sporting memories are the ones where I have been in teams that have trained hard, worked together for a common goal and never given up! I'm sure the same attitude amongst our teams still exists today.

Have you got a 'most memorable' sporting moment at WHS?

It is difficult to single one out as being the most memorable; over 23 years there have been many. I have really enjoyed taking students away on trips. Our students have always represented us extremely well and I have been proud to have been involved with the many wonderful young people who have gone through our school. I've enjoyed coaching our netball teams and seeing the improvement in their skills. However, if I was to single out one event, it would be when I was the manager for our school athletics team where 13 students travelled down to Invercargill to compete in the NZSS champs. That year we had a very talented group of students. All of them made finals; three of them winning NZ titles, two being named in the NZ team and nine athletes came back with medals. In our squad, we had talented 400 metrerunners so we entered a 4

x 400 relay team in both the Girls and Boys Open events. The girls ended up getting 2nd and the boys 3rd. One of those boys ended up getting an Athletics Scholarship to a university in America and another member of the team is currently working in our PE department - Mr Watkins.

Has there been growth in sport at WHS?

When I was a student at WHS back in the 1970's the choice of sports was very limited. I played netball, basketball, competed in cross country and was part of the school athletics team. Girls weren't allowed to compete in rugby, football or rowing and sports like touch, ultimate frisbee and the such hadn't been thought of then, but competition to be selected for our school teams was fierce. Travel was expensive, only one car per family if you were lucky, and we didn't seem to travel around nearly as much as our teams do now. We would never have thought about going to Palmy every week to play netball on a Saturday. So yes, lots of opportunities are available now.

What do you think needs to change in the sporting area that can help grow sport and athletes?

Turn off the computers and TV and go and play a sport. Just kidding, it's easier said than done. The key to growth is success. If a particular code is doing well, it is administered and organised properly; then students usually want to be part of that scene. When you have a group of people who are dedicated and passionate about their sport, then it will flourish. Success comes from hard work and the sense of belonging, especially if you are part of a team. We have been lucky over the years to have experienced and skillful coaches. This is an important aspect to success; having people who can guide, teach skills and make sport fun.

As for the future, sport is in good hands. Mrs Murphy is to be admired for her energy, forward thinking, organisational skills and dedication to seeing our students being given every opportunity to compete in sport. Her performance programme which includes off-season conditioning is the way forward. After 23 years, it is time to hand the reins over and even though I will not be involved with sport, I will always be taking a big interest in what is happening and no doubt will offer some advice along the way.








BOYS HOCKEY

Sprint Kayaking 2017: The 2016/2017 season proved to be quite successful for kayaking, peaking at the 2017 Sprint Kayaking Nationals 17th - 19th February. The competition was held at Lake Karapiro and involved athletes from different clubs throughout the country. Whanganui High School had 12 athletes competing in various races over 200m, 500m, 1000m and 5000m and across the age groups of Under 14, 16 and 18.

Top performances came from Jack Clifton and Lucas Thompson who brought home a large number of the medals across K1, K2 and K4 events. The stand out U16 pair started the regatta as fastest qualifying in the heat of their 200m K2 race, but shocked everyone in the final when they had a rocky start and fell out on the start line. However, they redeemed themselves in their 500m final, winning very comfortably. Jack also placed highly in his individual K1 races, gaining a gold medal in the 5km, and silver in the 200m and 500m. Lucas gained a bronze in both his 500m and 5km races as well. Their success didn't end there, as they then teamed up with Cameron Russell and Waitara paddler Nedas Gavutis in the under 16 men's K4 200m and 500m races, taking out gold in both. Cambell Tanner,

Liam Lace and Ethan Ross competed in the under 18 men's K4 200m with Lucas and 1000m with Jack, gaining bronze in both events. Sophie Brooke, Katie Foster, Jess Thompson and Nanea Schurhammer competed together in the under 16 women's K4 200m and 500m and gained bronze medals for both races. In

a less serious but just as competitive fun race, Cambell, Sophie and Anna Clifton teamed up with ex-Whanganui High School student Max Brown to place second in the Fun Mixed K4; which had to include 2 boys and 2 girls, each from a different age group. The under 16 women represented the largest age group from Whanganui, including Sophie, Katie, Jess and Nanea, as well as Ara Molijn. With this being such a large age group, competition was tough and only Sophie and Katie managed to make a K2 final. Sophie also made the final in the 200m and 500m, narrowly missing out on a podium finish which is guite an achievement.

Anna Clifton teamed up with a young Mana crew to compete in the under 14 women's K4 events, due to a lack of under 14 women at our Whanganui club. While they had steering issues in the 200m, they





managed to stay on course and gain bronze in the 500m. The under 18 men's age group was also fiercely contested with many New Zealand representatives competing, so our 3 paddlers did themselves proud. Cambell reached the A final in the K1 200m, while Ethan and Liam both reached the B final in the K1 200m.

Overall the regatta was very successful for the Whanganui Kayaking Club, considering that a smaller number of athletes competed than usual. The triumphant 2017 season continued at the New Zealand Marathon Championships on April 8th and 9th, when four athletes travelled to Porirua to compete over two days in both K1 and K2 events. On the first day, Jack Clifton took out gold by a huge margin in the under 16 men's K1 14km, while Anna Clifton gained a silver in the under 14 women's K1 7km. Liam Lace also competed in the under 18 men's K1 21km, missing out on a podium finish by 22 minutes, which is a very impressive result in such a competitive age group.
