Readings for this week: Dan 7:13-14; Rev 1:5-8; Jn 18:33b-37

We rejoice today in our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. The gospel reminds us that his "kingdom is not from this world". [Jo 18; 36] However, it is "in" this world, a world in which he came "to serve not to be served". [Mc 10; 45] He gave his all for us, the absolutely poor, as he hung upon the cross. As we revel in this kingship we might like to ponder the words of St Vincent de Paul talking about the love that goes with serving others:

"You will find out that Charity is a heavy burden to carry, heavier than the kettle of soup and the full basket. But you will keep your gentleness and your smile. It is not enough to give soup and bread. This the rich can do. You are the servant of the poor, always smiling and good-humoured. They are your masters, terribly sensitive and exacting masters, you will see. And the uglier and the dirtier they will be, the more unjust and insulting, the more love you must give them. It is only for your love alone that the poor will forgive you the bread you give to them."

We happily pay tribute to and salute the generous work of the members of our Society of St Vincent de Paul in Wanganui. Some among us might profitably consider joining the Society thus increasing its ability to help those in need and thereby help the parish in extending its care for them.

We willingly face the reactions St Vincent outlines with equanimity and continue to offer our help in ways the needy are able to accept. We should, with similar equanimity accept any hardship or criticism when we offer the gift of faith to the doubtful and uncertain, those without faith, the lapsed, even those who despise the truth God has imparted to us. I know how hard it can be to stand firm when one has gone out for an pleasant evening to be "attacked" and ridiculed for things of the faith perhaps even among one's own family. It is not easy, yet we must do it! And do it well.

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Next weeks readings: Jeremiah 33:14-16 | Thessalonians 3:12-4:2 Luke 21:25-38, 34-36

The very dramatic and frightening activity in nature described in next week's Gospel which ushers in the season of Advent, has largely been interpreted by Catholics as a factual account of the end of the world.

It's a difficult reading to understand because it uses language and images frequently used in the time of Jesus but not part of our way of expressing ourselves.

It might be a surprise to realise that the sun, the moon, the stars, the powers of the heavens, the sea that Luke's Jesus uses in describing his "return in glory" are the same elements of nature that brought order out of chaos when, in the Book of Genesis, God spoke the first words of creation, making the earth habitable for humans, animals, and plants.

Next week describes the opposite: the forces that keep order in the universe are upset; it regresses to the confusing, chaotic situation that existed before creation.

The apocalyptic imagery used by Jesus was a way of describing what was happening in the world of his time and is now happening in our world.

People commit abuses and injustices; hate reigns; there is violence, war, inhumane conditions; nature being destroyed by the exploitation of resources; while we live in fear that humanity is headed towards inevitable destruction.

Luke's Jesus assures us (and this is the central message of the gospel passage) that God's inspiration and power can help us create a new world from what seems like hopelessness and chaos if we do what the reading says: "stand up and raise [our] heads".

Pope Francis says, "The season of Advent [which starts next week] restores ... a hope which does not disappoint for it is founded on God's Word. Let us think about and feel this beauty."

As the watchful season of Advent approaches, let's all continue to pray for each other that we might grow in our witness to Christ present in our homes, schools, communities and places of work.
