WHANGANUI PARISH BULLETIN 17 FEBUARY 2019 6TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Readings for this week: Jer 17:5-8; I Cor15:12, 16-20; Lk 6:17, 20-26

Last week we heard St Paul handing on the tradition he had received, that Christ died for our sins, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scripture and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve, and to more than five hundred brothers and sisters. [see I Corinthians 15; 3-6] This Sunday we heard him admonish some of the Corinthians who say that there is no resurrection from the dead. [I Co 15: 12] In earlier sections of the letter had upbraided them for their poor behaviour in making divisions in the Church.

I wondered how the people to whom Jeremiah addressed the words, "Cursed are those who trust in mere mortals, and make mere flesh their strength." [Jeremiah 17; 8] reacted to his strong condemnation in his prophetic words.

As we heard on the Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time Jeremiah was told, ""Do not say, 'I am only a youth'; for to all to whom I send you, you shall go, and whatever I command you, you shall speak. Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you to deliver you, declares the Lord." [Jeremiah 1; 7-8]

It requires a great deal of courage to speak the truth of God. It also requires great humility and great trust and great courage to hear words of genuine criticism, correction and so on. Sometimes is it necessary to hear such words, even as our Lord himself uttered harsh criticisms to his hearers. Sadly many of these words are excised from the Sunday Lectionary readings. [see, for example, Matthew 18; 6]

Were they included we might find it easier to hear such words in our own day and learn from them. I remember years ago hearing an older and wiser priest telling to someone who was very cross at what the person thought had been said in an homily; "Go home, make a cup of tea, find a pleasant quiet place and then, 'Ask God what he is trying to tell you through your anger'." I heard later that the person concerned visited the priest to apologise, saying something like, "Thank you Father, you were so right!" Father John.

SEVENTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR

Next weeks readings: I Samuel 26:7-9, 12-13, 22-23; I Corinthians 15:45-49; Luke 6:27-38

Something to keep in mind as we reflect on next week's readings might be this: If we take them seriously and actually try to live by them we're possibly going to end up living by values very different to those that many of our friends and acquaintances live by. After all, how many of us really 'love our enemies', take time to 'do good to those who hate us', or cheerfully 'give to everyone who begs from us' to mention just one or two of the examples of being 'merciful as God is merciful' that Luke's Jesus puts in front of us in the Gospel

The first reading from Samuel gives us a concrete example of someone being 'merciful as God is merciful'. As the story unfolds King Saul leads 3.000 men into the desert to track down David and kill him. When the tables are turned and David has the opportunity to do what most Israelites would have done without a second thought, he does exactly the opposite and refuses to kill Saul.

Paul writing to the Corinthians suggests that anyone who is serious about the king-dom of God has to be different - "flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable."

Next week's readings are held together by a saying common to many religions - "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." As Luke's Jesus puts it to his followers, that means behaving quite differently from many of the people around us - turning the other cheek, giving not lending, loving not hating, forgiving not condemn-ing, generosity beyond measure are not everyone's set of values.


