WHANGANUI PARISH BULLETIN Z4 FEBUARY Z019 7TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Readings for this week: I Sam 26.2:7-9, 12-13, 22-25; I Cor 15:45-49; Lk 6:27-38

The story of David and Abishai sneaking into King Saul's camp in the dark of night is instructive. [I Samuel 26; 2-25] Abishai urges David to kill Saul while he is asleep. David refuses "for who can raise his hand against the Lord's anointed and be guiltless." [I Sam 26; 9] He takes Saul's spear and water jar instead, and the two leave the camp as soundlessly as they had entered.

In the morning David called to Saul from the hill across the valley saying, "As your life was precious today in my sight, so may my life be precious in the sight of the Lord, ..." [I Sam 26; 24]

As I thought about this story it gradually dawned on me that it could be the start of a personal meditation on the respect we should give to our fellow human beings. Each one is precious in God's sight for He has given life to each. We know that we should respect and preserve all life; abortion, euthanasia, murder, are strictly forbidden us.

We are fortunate in New Zealand that capital punishment has been abolished and replaced with a life sentence (the convicted person must serve a minimum of ten years in prison and remains on parole for the remainder of life).

Respecting people, realising and living that they are precious requires far more than only respecting life. I read all sorts of reports about the way people treat each other in the workplace and at home. I see accounts of bullying, sexist behaviour, and so on., When I had finished reading the newspaper account, for example, of the behaviour of MP's, parliamentary staff and such people I was appalled.

After a little thought I wondered where the normal respectful behaviour of my youth had gone. Ordinary good manners dictates that one treats everyone with care and courtesy. The behaviour our Lord outlines in the Sermon on the Plain in Luke's Gospel reminds us how we should behave towards everyone, whether we like them or not, however bad their behaviour may be to us.

We are to love our neighbour no matter what.

EIGHTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR Next weeks readings: Sirach 27:4-7; I Corinthians 15:54-58; Luke 6:39-45

Next week's readings give us an opportunity to reflect on the effect our words and action have on others and how our words give others a glimpse of who we really are, what our values are, and what is important in our

The passage from Sirach reminds us that what we say is a pretty good indicator of what we think and feel – "....the test of a person is in conversation a person's speech discloses the cultivation of the mind" or as the gospel reading puts it in its final sentence: ".....it is out of the abundance of the heart that the mouth speaks."

Closer to our own time, Mahatma Gandhi put it this way:

"Your beliefs become your thoughts,

Your thoughts become your words,

Your words become your actions,

Your actions become your habits,

Your habits become your values,

Your values become your destiny."

Or taking it back to how Luke puts it in the gospel reading: "No good tree bears bad fruit.....Out of the good treasure of the heart, the good person produces good.....
